
1) Go to Gallery 4. Look at the carved woode	n blocks which Morris & Co used to print their designs.

## 4) Trellis

This is Morris' earliest design for block-printed wallpaper made in 1862. In the middle of the room is a modern reconstruction of the printing process. Each colour or shade would require a new block
