

PAPER CUP FLOWER

You will need

- Paper cup
- Coloured paper/newspaper/ magazine
- Paint
- Glue
- Scissors
- A whole punch (optional)



ACTIVITY DEVISED BY SCRIBBLE & SMUDGE

- 1. Choose one colour for the petals and another for the centre of the flower. You can either use painted/coloured paper or look through newspapers/magazines and cut out pictures with those colours. Rip into little pieces and set aside.
- 2. Take your paper cup and cover the inside with glue.
- Stick the coloured paper or torn newspaper/magazine cuttings for the petals (make sure they're colour-side up) on to the inside of the cup.
- To make the petals, cut the cup with several slits from the rim to 3cm away from the base, then curl them back on themselves.

William Morris loved flowers! Here's a wallpaper he designed called Wild Tulip

- Now take the coloured paper or ripped newspaper/magazine cuttings in the colour you chose for the centre, screw up into a ball and stick to the inside base of the cup.
- 6. Leave everything to dry (check after an hour).
- 7. Hole punch (or just cut into small circles with scissors) some more coloured paper or newspaper/ magazine cuttings to make seeds.
- Cover the centre with glue and sprinkle the seeds over. Shake off any that haven't stuck.
- If you like, you can mount the flower on to a stick or rolled tube of card.
